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## NYU RECEIVES \$1.96 MILLION GRANT TO STUDY NURSES' WORK DECISIONS

## Five-Year Nationwide Study to Aid in Easing the Nursing Shortage

The NYU College of Nursing has received a five-year, \$1.96 million grant from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation to study newly-licensed nurses in order to track changes in their careers. The national study will periodically survey recent graduates of registered nurse (RN) programs over the first four years of their careers to track the underlying reasons for their work decisions.

In the face of continuing nursing shortages, exploring the conditions that influence new nurses to remain in, or leave, their positions will be particularly useful. The researchers, who expect to send surveys to 5,000 recent graduates of nursing programs, hope their findings will inform health- care organizations and policymakers' efforts to retain qualified RNs and improve the environments in which they work.

Christine Kovner, RN, Ph.D., FAAN, of the NYU College of Nursing is the principal investigator. Carol Brewer, RN, Ph.D., of the University of Buffalo School of Nursing is the co-principal investigator. William Greene, Ph.D., an expert in econometrics, at the NYU Stern School of Business, is a co-investigator.

"New graduates of nursing programs who become registered nurses are essential to balancing the supply and demand for these professionals," says Dr. Kovner. "Although enrollments in nursing programs have recently begun to rise again, there is some concern that newly licensed RNs leave hospital positions more frequently than RNs with more experience." Dr. Brewer added, "It is important for us to know whether new nurses are leaving particular settings, or the profession. The answers will point to very different solutions."

"We deeply appreciate the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's strong support for this important study on an issue that is so critical to the health of our nation," said Terry Fulmer, Ph.D., RN, FAAN, dean of the NYU College of Nursing. "The findings will in turn help leaders in the field make informed decisions about where in the system we need to make greater investments in educating, hiring, and retaining excellent nurses."
